

EGWA 2024 RESOLUTIONS

Resolution 1: Synodality in Action for Past Pupils of Don Bosco

Resolution 4: Communication and Digitalization

By adopting this resolution, we commit to harnessing the power of communication and digitalization to strengthen our mission, foster unity, and create a more connected and vibrant global community of past pupils and friends of Don Bosco.

Resolution 5: Sharing Good Practices of Past Pupils of Don Bosco

The World Confederation of Past Pupils of Don Bosco remains committed to its roots promoting the Salesian work and serving young people; and recognizes the importance of sharing best practices and inspiring one another to achieve greater impact in our communities.

We acknowledge that there is a wealth of valuable experiences and projects undertaken by our associations and Federations worldwide.

Therefore, we resolve:

- Compilation of Good Practices: The World Confederation shall create and maintain a comprehensive online compendium of successful projects and services implemented by its associations across the five continents.
- Accessibility and Sharing: The compendium shall be easily accessible to all to everyone and the general public, providing detailed information, including project goals, outcomes, and lessons learned.
- Inspiration and Collaboration: The compendium shall serve as a source of inspiration for federations and associations to learn from one another's successes and identify opportunities for collaboration and support.
- Promotion of Education and Care of Young People: The sharing of good practices will strengthen the World Confederation's commitment to promoting the education and care of young people in the Don Bosco way.
- Call to Action: The World Confederation encourages all member associations to contribute their stories of success to the compendium, helping to create a vibrant and informative resource for the global Salesian family.

Resolution 6: Establishment of a Secretariat for the World Confederation of Past Pupils of Don Bosco

The Confederation seeks to enhance its operational efficiency and effectiveness in supporting its member organizations worldwide; and

Whereas the establishment of a Secretariat would provide a centralized hub for coordination, communication, and resource management;

Therefore, be it resolved that:

The World Confederation of Past Pupils of Don Bosco shall establish a Secretariat as an integral part of the Salesian Family.

The Secretariat's primary functions shall include:

- Supporting the operations of the World Confederation as a network of worldwide organizations.
- Promoting the identity, values, and mission of the Confederation as reflected in its Statutes.
- Facilitating communication and collaboration among member organizations.
- Providing administrative and logistical support.
- Managing resources and finances.

To compliment this initiative, Regional Secretariats shall be established to work in synodality between regions at the world level.

The Presidency of the World Confederation shall oversee the establishment of regional Secretariats in conjunction with National and Provincial Federations.

Resolution 7: Promoting Mentoring among Past Pupils of Don Bosco

Mentoring is a vital expression of the past pupils and friends of Don Bosco's commitment to serving young people, particularly those in need; and there is a strong interest among past pupils in incorporating mentoring programs into their organization. Online training can enhance accessibility and global participation in mentoring programmes.

Therefore, be it resolved that:

- 1. The World Confederation of Past Pupils of Don Bosco will explore the development of online mentoring programmes to support past pupils in their efforts to serve young people.
- 2. The Confederation will consider various formats for online training, including webinars, interactive sessions, and a dedicated online platform.
- 3. The Confederation will collect feedback from past pupils to identify specific topics of interest and tailor the mentoring programmes accordingly.

By adopting this resolution, the Confederation can provide valuable resources and support to past pupils who wish to engage in mentoring activities and make a positive impact on the lives of young people.
